A Note from Craig Lowery, Head of School

It's difficult to look back on a year more unique and impactful than the 2019/2020 school year for Park Academy. You might think that it was defined by difficulty and struggle, and yet that is not the first thing that comes to my mind. What I do see are resilience and innovation!

In November of 2019, Park Academy made a bold step onto the national stage when Portland hosted the 2019 International Dyslexia Association annual conference, welcoming more than 1,800 educators and professionals from across the globe. I had the honor of serving as the local co-chair for the conference and organized a site visit to Park Academy. At this visit, over 50 professional educators hailing from coast to coast, spent the day observing and learning about the incredible services being provided to students at Park Academy. We were able to demonstrate how we use research and science to provide cutting edge literacy and



executive functioning services to Park Academy students and I could not have been prouder of our community.

In March, the world flipped upside down. In a time when most of the world froze, Park Academy did not. We closed our doors to in-person education on a Thursday and by Monday had a fully operational, full-time, remote learning program, up and running. Nearly all of our instruction was and continues to be done through face-to-face classes and meetings. Our reading students continue to receive direct Orton-Gillingham based classes every single weekday! Despite serving a population that faces more difficulty than their peers, especially in an online world, our kids thrived and continue to thrive. We used the valuable lessons learned in the spring to refine our services this fall, creating opportunity and continuity for our students and community.

Now as we look to an uncertain future we are utilizing innovative practices and unique online learning opportunities to reach even more students. We have taken advantage of the state of education in Oregon to enroll students in remote education that may not have otherwise had the opportunity to attend Park Academy. Now that we know and understand that we can provide a quality education through electronic means, we are examining ways that we might serve students in remote parts of Oregon or live out of state. These are practices we believe will help us to improve our program and expand our reach to even more students who need what Park Academy has to offer. We believe that this impact will last beyond the mandate for remote learning and will help us have an even bigger impact on the global dyslexic community.

So, it is with a great deal of pride that I look back on the 2019/2020 school year. Pride for what we have accomplished, pride for an incredible staff that dedicates their energy and love to Park Academy Students, and pride that we continue to be innovative leaders in the field of education. Now it is with hope that I look to the years to come and what we might be able to build on top of the foundation put in place! Thank you for being a part of this process and Park Academy's evolution.





- Park Academy serves almost 100 students in grades 3 - 12.
- 35% of our students are in need of scholarship.
- Almost 100% of our high school graduates leave Park Academy with a plan for post secondary education (2 year, 4 year University or trade school).
- Students develop skills and confidence to advocate for themselves as lifelong learners.
- Students participate in a wide variety of extracurricular activities, including athletics, Boy Scouts, internships and service.
- Students have received national recognition for sports, academics and community involvement.







Program and Community Information

Students who enter Park Academy in grades 3, 4, and 5 generally do so significantly behind in their reading skills. In fact, most of our 3rd-grade students are non-readers when they enter. It is a difficult and slow process as these students tend to be significantly impacted by dyslexia, working memory, and processing speed. However, our data shows that nearly every student who entered Park Academy in Grades 3-5 in the last three years has made a full years' growth each year they have been enrolled. Those more impacted with dyslexia both phonologically and orthographically have made measurable progress each year.





Of our current 51 students in Grades 3-8, 22 of them are now reading at grade level and 13 are within one year of grade-level achievement. Of the remaining 16 students, the majority of them have been at Park for three years or less. As the Orton-Gillingham methodology is designed to be implemented in a 5-7 year cycle, Park Academy is actually clearly accelerating student movement toward proficient reading.

Of our 2020 middle school graduates, 8 of the 11 students were reading at or above grade level. Of our high school graduates, 9 of 11 were reading at or above grade level and many of them scored at a post-high school level.

Park Academy uses a robust assessment system to monitor student progress, evaluating oral and silent reading fluency; phonological processing skills such as letter naming and phoneme segmentation; and vocabulary and comprehension. We have continued to compile as much data as we can even during comprehensive distance learning and the results are reflected above. Even when delivering our program remotely, our students have continued to show strong, measurable progress.






Distance Learning

Students whose dyslexia leads to feelings of "less than" and an inability to learn. These struggles take a toll on a young person and can manifest as anxiety and depression. Park Academy offers students and their families hope and a transformative education. Once enrolled, many students find that they ARE quite intelligent and capable. They learn the tools they need to succeed and they begin to find their spirit again.

In addition, former Head of School Paula Kinney and founder, Piper Park honored Jeff Mengis for his commitment and support of the school. With Jeff's volunteer service as the head of the development committee, Park Academy has been able to raise the funds necessary to ensure that finances are not a barrier to any student.
